Youth-led Report: "What does a Youth-led Diagnostic on Youth Employment tell us about Jordan, Liberia, and South Africa?"



Eight Yale students worked with the World Bank to lead research on youth employment challenge in Jordan, Liberia and South Africa. Photo is from a recent World Bank Brown-Bag Lunch in January. S4YE partnered with a diverse group of student researchers from the Yale University Jackson Institute for Global Affairs for research on three countries in which the Bank is currently designing youth employment operations - Jordan, Liberia and South Africa. Over four months, the students worked with the Task Team Leaders in the Social Protection and Jobs Group, conducted stocktake and gap analysis and compiled their findings in a report "Meeting the Challenge of Youth **Unemployment: Analysis and Lessons** from Jordan, Liberia, and South **Africa**". They interviewed representatives from select programs, country experts and local youth themselves, cataloging a total of 108 interventions.

New Opportunity

The Tunisia Youth Economic Inclusion Project, a WB-funded project operated by the Ministry of Vocational Training and Employment, aims at improving earning opportunities for a vulnerable segment of the population in selected governorates of Tunisia through an integrated approach providing targeted employment services to disadvantaged young men and women, while promoting entrepreneurs and businesses as engines of job creation. In this context, the Ministry has published four requests for **expression of interests** for:

- Design and implementation of orientation sessions for 5000 youth and development of a curriculum for soft skills
- Design of a curriculum for employability of disadvantaged youth

- Design of a curriculum for pre and post creation support of disadvantaged youth
- Design and implementation of a grievances redress mechanism and a platform for youth participation

J-PAL is a global research center working to reduce poverty by ensuring that policy is informed by scientific evidence. The J-PAL Labor Markets sector focuses on easing young people's transitions into the working world, providing the skills entrepreneurs need to succeed, helping the unemployed get back into work, and helping businesses grow and innovate. The sector is chaired by Marianne Bertrand (University of Chicago) and Bruno Crepon (ENSAE and École Polytechnique). J-PAL will contribute to the S4YE **Impact Portfolio** by sharing relevant findings from its research with the partners and by supporting them to seek collaborations with their affiliated professors for research projects.

GAN is a business driven alliance with the overarching goal of encouraging and linking business initiatives on skills and employment opportunities for youth notably through apprenticeships. (YBI) provides valuable insights for organizations wishing to scale the impact of their
entrepreneurship programs. It highlights success factors, challenges and lessons

learned from organizations that have taken their work to scale in a variety of contexts. Report available here.

- Reducing search barriers for jobseekers: This J-PAL <u>synthesis</u> of 19 randomized evaluations looks at how to improve employment outcomes for jobseekers. This review shows that job search assistance helped jobseekers look for jobs in better places and increased their search efforts. Helping jobseekers communicate their abilities often benefitted the jobseekers and firms who hired them.
- Work in Progress-Improving Youth Labor Market Outcomes in Emerging Market and Developing Economies: This discussion note from the IMF draws on new analyses that use macro- and microeconomic data to look at how broad structural policies, including labor and product market reforms, can address challenges in the youth labor market. With most of their working life ahead of them youth make up about a third of the working-age population in the typical emerging market and developing economy. But the youth in these economies face a daunting labor market—about 20 percent of them are neither employed, in school, nor in training (the youth inactivity rate).
- The Survey of Adult Skills (PIAAC): This international survey is conducted in over 40 countries as part of the Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC). It measures the key cognitive and workplace skills needed for individuals to participate in society and for economies to prosper. The evidence from this Survey will help countries better understand how education and training systems can nurture these skills. Educators, policy makers and labor economists will use this information to develop economic, education and social policies that will continue to enhance the skills of adults.
