We are very happy to share with you that we have finalized the selection of 32 new projects to join our existing partners in the S4YE Impact Portfolio, our external community of practice (CoP). This new cohort represents innovations on a broad range of topics like digital jobs, digital platforms, impact sourcing, business incubation, the inclusion of refugees, and jobs in agricultural value chains. There is also a good geographic representation including 15 projects from Africa, 4 from the Middle East and North Africa, 4 from Latin America, 2 in South Asia, and 5 are Global Projects. Young social entrepreneurs can play a vital role in reducing youth unemployment by creating opportunities for those around them. However, one common challenge that social ventures face is raising funds that would make their businesses or initiatives sustainable. Every new or growing social venture might need to map relevant donors and come up with effective strategies for fundraising. Fundraising can take many shapes from submitting a grant proposal to crowdfunding.

S4YE hosted a webinar on How to Write Effective Grant Applications where Mastercard Foundation, the United States African Development Foundation, the World Bank, and two S4YE Youth Advisory Group members shared information about what is effective in writing grant proposals, demonstrating how young entrepreneurs could improve their grant writing skills to make their ventures more sustainable. Updates from the Impact Portfolio

- UPSHIFT: To provide opportunities for young unaccompanied migrants UNICEF and
 its partner JA-Italia decided to launch the Naro chapter of the UPSHIFT program in
 Sicily. The classes include migrants and their Italian peers and offer a space where
 they can discuss their social ideas together and start to turn their ideas into
 innovative projects with everyday social impact. Click here to read the latest photo

- Knack: Knack has released a set of algorithms that focus on the skills, competencies, and mindsets that are necessary for thriving in the future of work. These 21st Century Knack algorithms encompass the shifting nature of work: the substitution of expertise with learning, the critical role of rapid learning, the shrinking half-time of knowledge, the interplay between humans and machines, the rapid innovation imperative, and the distributed/remote nature of work.
- Work4Progress (W4P): W4P recently celebrated its 2nd Annual Conference
 bringing together more than 40 representatives of the 3 Work4Progress platforms as
 well as international experts. W4P also launched a challenge in June to cover
 specific technological needs detected during the listening phase. It is open to
 Universities, Non-Profits, and Private Companies, and it looks for proven solutions
 adapted to the local contexts.
- **Educate!** Educate! board members Dr. Nicole Goldin and Dr. Dingaan Mutumbuka recently authored an article for the Diplomatic Courier in recognition of Africa Day. The **article** discusses how growing youth populations are a primary unifying trait across the continent, and how leveraging this demographic resource is the best step countries can take for driving the progress that Africa Day exists to honor.
- Empower Youth for Work: EYW project in Bangladesh has published a <u>report</u> on "Understanding Employers' Views on Decent Work in Bangladesh" to gain an insight into the opinions, attitudes, and practices of employers in the informal sector, challenges, and opportunities in creating decent work.
- Open Learning Exchange (OLE): OLE is launching the first remote Community Development Center in Har Har, a village in northern Somalia. Based on the community's priorities, the focus of career pathways will be Health, Energy, and Transportation. Galway University, partnering with Mogadishu University, will provide support for that community for about 2,000 youth.
- Habitat: <u>Habitat</u> in Turkey will soon be organizing three-day boot camps and
 acceleration for their beneficiaries. These will focus on entrepreneurial skills
 development of the participants providing vertical training, mentoring sessions, and
 inspirational talks by migrant & refugee entrepreneurs.

Unleashing the Entrepreneurial Power of Rural Youth: IFAD has launched its
2019 Rural Development Report, <u>Creating Opportunities for Rural Youth</u>, which
focuses on the importance of youth for rural development, constraints that they
face, and how to embed rural youth policy and investments in broader rural
development strategies. Rural youth development focuses on three mutuallyreinforcing factors: productivity, connectivity, and agency. This report creates a
roadmap for development strategies that incorporate a focus on rural youth.
